What is a phrase?

A phrase is a multi-word unit whose meaning is not given by the parts of the individual words that make it up.

In a phrase each word loses its original meaning and the words combined acquire a new meaning.



What is a phrasal verb?

A <u>phrasal verb</u> is a verb followed by one or two or more particles (adverbs or prepositions) that change the original meaning of the verb.

"China will be allowed to build hundreds of additional coal plants. So, we can't build the plants, but they can, according to this agreement. India <u>will be allowed</u> to double its coal production by 2020. Think of it: India can double their coal production. We're supposed to <u>get rid of ours</u>. Even Europe is allowed to continue construction of coal plants.

"In short, the agreement doesn't eliminate coal jobs, it just transfers those jobs out of America and the United States, and <u>ships</u> them to foreign countries.
